

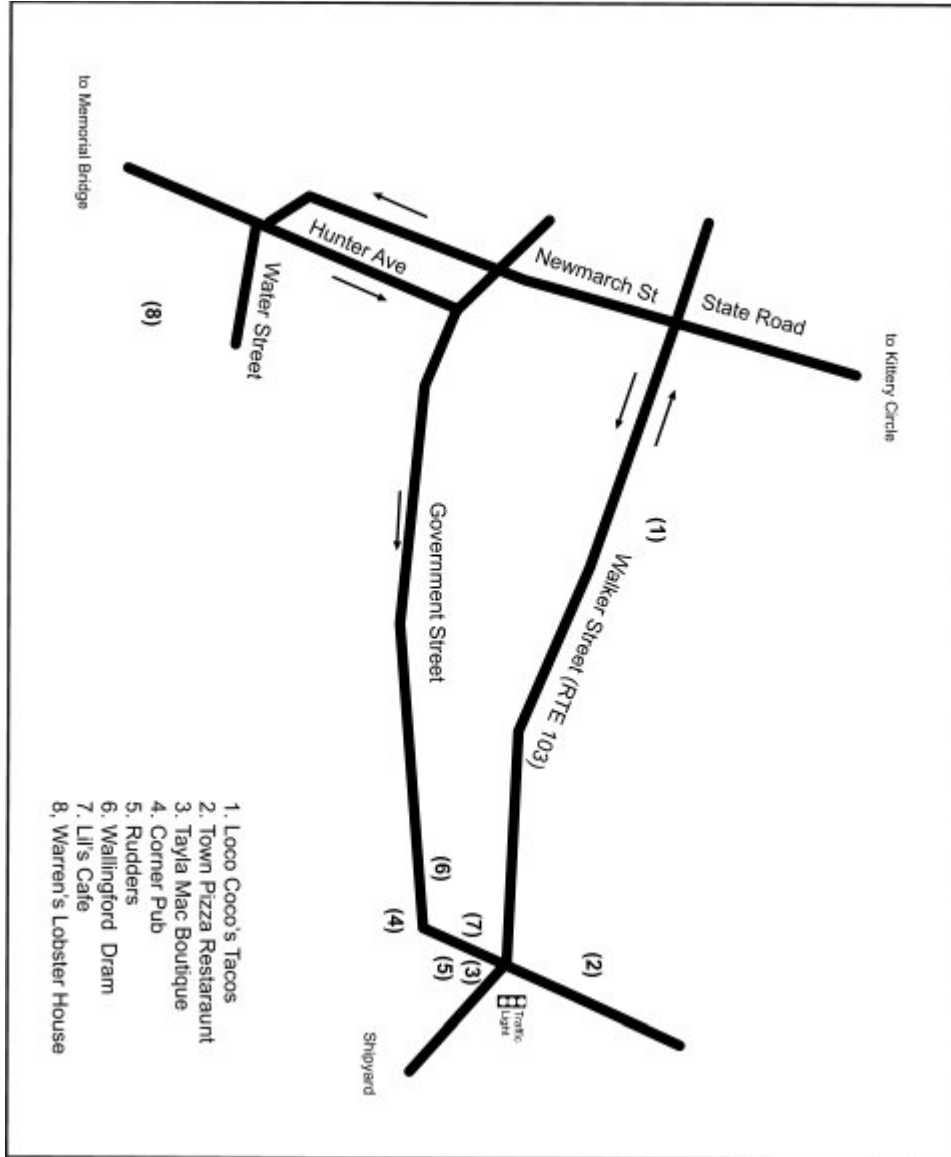
Newword
